Funding for the Recruitment Day Activities.

As we ask tenured faculty to pay higher dues for the FWC, we want everyone to know that all the Recruitment Drive activities were funded by a grant from National AAUP. Lunch for new faculty, printing costs for 2 (possibly 3) issues of the newsletter, Pat Shaw's expenses, gala reception, raffle prizes at the FWC Meeting, *everything* was entirely funded by National AAUP and our grant.

Open Faculty Welfare Committee/AAUP Meeting.

Another great turnout! Pat Shaw told how Arthur Lovejoy, one of the founders of the AAUP, got involved in the first AAUP investigation. On a train ride from Johns Hopkins to New York, where he was headed for a short vacation, Lovejoy bought a newspaper in Newark and read that 17 faculty members at the University of Utah had resigned to protest the administration's arbitrary dismissal of some faculty. The editorial writers said they couldn't judge the merits of the case, but assumed it would be investigated by the newly formed AAUP and that the public would be informed in due time. Now, even though the AAUP had no funds and no structures for investigating committees at this time, Lovejoy read the editorial and realized, **"It's up to us."** He went straight to Columbia to meet with Prof. John Dewey, AAUP's first President. The next morning, Dewey went to the bank and got Lovejoy \$300; he was off to the University of Utah the next morning to investigate. *It's up to us.*

We found the panel discussion to be a moving and historic event. Marty Lang (Religious Studies, retired), Kevin Cassidy (Politics), Dee Lippman (Nursing), Rick DeWitt (Philosophy), Richard Regan (English), Cheryl Tromley (Management) and Don Greenberg (Politics) all told great stories - we hope to convey some of them in upcoming newsletters. Many of the panelists are not only founding members of the chapter, but faculty activists who worked hard to negotiate for policies that faculty continue to benefit from: our commitment to the AAUP's 95th percentile, Fachex (tuition exchange at Jesuit universities), faculty maternity policy, Tuition Exchange program, faculty condos, and more. It *is* up to us.

During the Q&A, someone asked Pat Shaw how many other advocacy chapters (i.e., non-union chapters, like Fairfield) have over 70% membership. His answer was, "You're it." In fact, at National AAUP, they talk about the "Fairfield model", it's *the* example of a strong and organized advocacy chapter. We hope that our founding members, as they recalled their earlier days of incredibly hard organizing work, realized that the organization they founded nearly 20 years ago is now a campus institution and a model for National AAUP. It's up to *us*.
