The CT State Conference-AAUP annual spring meeting was held on May 6 at the Graduate Club in New Haven. This year's topic, "The Kitchen Table in the Ivory Tower: The Personal and Professional Impact of Economic Hard Times" was addressed by panelists Dan Livingston, labor attorney and progressive activist and Jenn Nichols, senior program officer in the AAUP Department of Organizing and Services. The program was moderated by Dave Walsh, President CT State University-AAUP and long-time AAUP activist.

Of special interest to Fairfield's faculty was the presentation of the CSC George E. Lang, Jr. Award to Fairfield Professor Matt Kubasik. The George Lang award was established in 2007 by the CSC-AAUP to honor the memory of our colleague, George Lang. The award recognizes a faculty member at Fairfield who early in his or her career has shown awareness of and dedication to AAUP principles such as academic freedom and faculty governance.

Matt Kubasik was the unanimous choice of the FWC Executive Committee (that has the distinct pleasure of selecting the recipient). In addition to a deep understanding of the importance of faculty governance, Matt was cited for his good work on the Salary Committee, bringing the concerns of new faculty members to the table and making progress on addressing those concerns.

Team One blew the game open with eight runs in the first inning, after which solid defense took over for both teams. (Continued next page)




