Prof. Boryczka attended a full slate of workshops including, presented for the first time by The Ruckus Society, Preparing Direct Action Media: Messaging, Framing & Storytelling and Planning Non-Violent Direct Action. A highlight of this year's SI was the Chicago Labor History Tour with a guide from the Illinois Labor History Society with stops that included Haymarket Square, Hull House, the Stockyard Gate and Forest Home Cemetery. Connecticut State Conference-AAUP George E. Lang, Jr. Award

George Lang was a faculty member at Fairfield in the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science for 37 years until his sudden death after a brief illness in May 2007. In addition to his long and productive career as a scholar and teacher, he was extremely active in the AAUP at the national, state and local level. He served on national AAUP's governing Council, the Committee on the Economic Status of the Profession, and the Committee on College and University Governance. In the Connecticut State Conference-AAUP, he served on the executive committee for decades in several different offices and was serving as CSC-AAUP Treasurer at the time of his death. On our campus, as anyone who was here when George was here will know, he was a selfless and tireless advocate for faculty rights and equally selfless and tireless in insisting that those essential rights are inescapably intertwined with faculty obligations. Working on numerous committees, both ad hoc and formal, serving three terms as Secretary of the General Faculty and serving constantly on our Faculty Welfare Committee/AAUP chapter Executive Committee, he strengthened our University and its faculty. As Prof. Joe Dennin noted in a remembrance of George at a meeting of the General Faculty in September 2007, "[George] was always prepared with the appropriate facts and figures and presented them in calm, rational and persistent arguments. He was both a dedicated foot soldier and an intelligent leader - whatever the battle needed, George was willing and able to supply." As we mark the fifth anniversary of his death, his colleagues on the FWC/ AAUP once again gratefully acknowledge his far-reaching contributions to Fairfield's faculty, to Fairfield, and to the academic profession.

The Connecticut State Conference of the AAUP established The George E. Lang Jr. Award in October 2007 to honor the memory of their colleague by recognizing a faculty member at Fairfield University who early in his or her career has shown awareness of and dedication to important AAUP issues such as academic freedom, faculty governance, and faculty rights and responsibilities. The CSC invites Fairfield's FWC/AAUP to select the recipient, and this CT State Conference award is presented at the CSC-AAUP's annual spring meeting every year in May.

2011 Lang Award Recipient: Debra M. Strauss

On May 12, 2011, at the Connecticut State Conference-AAUP annual spring meeting at the Graduate Club in New Haven, FWC/AAUP Vice-President Joe Dennin and CSC-AAUP President Irene Mulvey presented the fourth annual George E. Lang, Jr. CSC-AAUP Award to Professor Debra M. Strauss. Deb is an Associate Professor of Business Law in the Management Department at the Dolan School of Business where she teaches International Law, the Legal Environment of Business, and Business Law and Ethics in the M.B.A. program. She has written a book and numerous articles on the courts, judicial clerkships and diversity issues. Most recently, her work has concerned presenting models for civil lawsuits against terrorist groups and state sponsors of terrorism, labeling and monitoring genetically modified organisms in food, and food security.

In selecting Deb for the 2011 Lang Award, chapter leaders noted her service and thoughtful leadership on the Academic Council. She chaired the AC Harassment Policy Subcommittee, which arose out of a controversy over material published in The Mirror and subsequent filing of complaints by students claiming the published content violated the University's harassment policy. Led by Deb, the committee focused on important issues such as academic freedom and freedom of expression (based on AAUP statements), since the accusations of harassment could have had a chilling effect on all sorts of intellectual and artistic expression, but the committee balanced this with concerns about genuine and potentially serious incidents of harassment in all forms. This AC SC, chaired by Deb, produced an incredibly comprehensive report that resulted in a new policy on harassment and discrimination that is in our Journal of Record and the Student Handbook.

Deb was encouraged to run for and was elected to the FWC/AAUP Executive Committee in 2010. At the time she received the award, she had just been elected to a three-year term on the Faculty Salary Committee (she is 2012-13 Chair of FSC) and was scheduled to attend the AAUP Summer Institute at Suffolk University in Boston.

In just 10 years at Fairfield, Deb has actively promoted some of the AAUP's most fundamental principles and, as we noted as the award was presented, she is poised to play a much larger leadership role at Fairfield. We think George would be positively thrilled that Deb was awarded the fourth annual CSC-AAUP Lang Award.

In anticipation of the award presentation, CSC-AAUP President Irene Mulvey had asked Deb about her connections with George and, during the presentation, told the crowd what Deb had said, "I had the great privilege of knowing George. He was very welcoming to me as a new faculty member and we had several collegial conversations. I looked up to him and am honored to be associated with his name and his memory."

2012 Lang Award Recipient: Dave Crawford

On May 10, 2012, at the Connecticut State Conference-AAUP annual spring meeting at the Graduate Club in New Haven, FWC/AAUP President Jocelyn Boryczka presented the fifth annual George E. Lang, Jr. CSC-AAUP Award to Professor Dave Crawford. Dave came to our Department of Sociology and Anthropology in 2003 after completing his dissertation in Anthropology at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He works primarily as an economic and environmental anthropologist in the High Atlas Moutains of Morocco, and he has published on everything from theories of globalization and Berber identity to the perils of conducting fieldwork with autistic children.

In selecting Dave for the 2012 Lang Award, chapter leaders noted especially his fearlessness in sharing his thoughtful opinions on topics of importance when needed. He served on the Faculty Salary Committee at a time when the FSC was dealing with a number of complicated and contentious changes to our contract and benefits. Some people on the FSC are numbers people and some are big picture people; Dave is definitely not the former and most definitely the latter. His ability to cut through numbers to get at the underlying principles was highly praised, as was his talent for always being prepared to argue forcefully and eloquently for what was right. Sometimes this meant turning his considerable powers of persuasion on the administration and sometimes on his colleagues - truly collaborative and collegial thinking that leads to the best decisions. Almost as important, his colleagues on the FSC reported that his totally irreverent and incredibly quick sense of humor helped everyone through many long hours of meetings. On the FSC, he was a particularly strong advocate for the junior faculty - like George always was - arguing for their concerns in a variety of ways, including trying to develop a multi-phased proposal for faculty housing assistance. Dave also served the

faculty by chairing his department, and it was noted that the anthropologist's perspective that he brings to analyzing faculty culture makes him an invaluable mentor to his departmental colleagues.

Dave reported that his first encounter with George was at one of George's "Fluid Flow Seminars" (held at a local bar during happy hour on Fridays). Dave reports that these "seminars" were "occasions that were as intellectually stimulating as they were politically generative". A long-ago email on the Fluid Flow Seminar from George to new faculty: "If you're new, here's the protocol. We get a table in the back. The pregnant and those who took the pledge are on their own. The first one there gets a pitcher of good beer (traditionally Harp, Sam or Bass). When that's gone someone else among the drinkers gets another pitcher. If you land up drinking free all night, plan on picking up a round early next time - Assistant Professors get to hold back longer, us heavier drinkers sooner. In the past some splinter group started a pitcher of lite beer - they got teased, but continued anyway; I will have no part of organizing such activity."

The following note was posted on The Stag Spotlight in early September:

University Maintenance Workers to be unionized:

At an election held in early August [2012], employees in the Fairfield University Department of Facilities Management voted for union representation by Local 30 of the International Union of Operating Engineers. Approximately 33 maintenance employees (grounds crew, carpenters, painters, electricians, HVAC technicians and mechanics) are involved; supervisors and managers are not part of this bargaining unit. The University and union will seek to reach a collective bargaining agreement over the course of the coming months. There is no set timetable for this process to be completed, and first contracts such as these can take several months or longer to finalize. However, the University is working towards concluding these negotiations as expeditiously as possible.
